

### PASTOR'S POINT

Dear one and all. It's December 2019, we are, at this writing at the beginning of Advent (the four Sundays prior to the celebration of Jesus' birth) and we have snow. These are most of the classic "touch stones" of Winter in Wisconsin. But... (please read the Gospel lesson for Dec. 29th Mt. 2:13-23) In this lesson we read God's word that is not "sweet baby Jesus", all swaddled in a Manger type stuff.

Mat 2:13 NLT After the wise men were gone, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up! Flee to Egypt with the child and His mother," the angel said. "Stay there until I tell you to return, because Herod is going to search for the child to kill Him."

This imagery does not square with our visions of a great Christmas season, of family, friends, faith, presents, red and green colors and candle-lit worship services.

Did you ever think about Jesus being a refugee, fleeing persecution? Try out this definition of persecution: "A family is forced to flee their homeland for fear of persecution." Does this definition look anything like the Matthew 2:13 text? I think it does. It is strange to see our Jesus' face as a persecuted refugee with the faces we've come to see on the news claiming refugee status. We do not often think of or conceptualize our Jesus in these same ways with these same images, boarders,

walls, refugee camps etc.

When the whole lesson from Matthew is considered, one can see how God is at work through many and various themes, persons, and even despicable personages to bring about God's will. Look at how the prophesy has been announced:


Hos 11:1 NLT "When Israel was a child, I loved him, and I called My son out of Egypt.

To see Jesus and the church properly, we need to see God's hand at work looking back through the long arc of history. Our lives, Jesus flight from persecution, the fulfillment of prophesy.

Consider this prophesy:

Jer 31:15 NLT This is what the LORD says: "A cry is heard in Ramah—deep anguish and bitter weeping. Rachel weeps for her children, refusing to be comforted—for her children are gone."

Even in the midst of great calamity and chaos God's derivative and capable hand is at work in our lives, and in the lives of all who inhabit the world. We are not, nor was Jesus, living at a time of randomness, a time when things spun out of control from the hand of our God. Yes the times we live in are scary, they are truly dangerous, and they do appear to be random...but as I've said, before, and will continue to say again, God's God this! Amen!



### POINSETTA ORDERS DUE SUNDAY, December 8th

What is the meaning of poinsettias? Also known as the Christmas Star and Christmas Flower, it's said that poinsettias' association with Christmas comes from a Mexican legend. The story goes that a child, with no means for a grander gift, gathered humble weeds from the side of the road to place at the church alter on Christmas Eve. As the congregation witnessed a Christmas miracle, the weeds turned into brilliant red and green flowers.

Named after Joel Roberts Poinsett, first United States ambassador to Mexico and the amateur botanist who introduced the plant to the U.S. in 1825, the poinsettia is also known as Mexican Flame Leaf, Winter Rose, Noche Buena and, in Turkey, Atakurk's Flower, because it was the favorite flower of Atakurk, the founder of modern Turkey.

While considered by the ancient Aztecs to be symbols of purity, in today's language

of flowers, red, white or pink poinsettias, the December birth flower, symbolize good cheer and success and are said to bring wishes of mirth and celebration.

for the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund



Pastor Barry opened the meeting in prayer at 6:05 pm. Chad motioned that the September minutes be approved, Charlotte seconded. Minutes were approved.

Treasurer: Virginia will have the budget ready for approval at the next council meeting, she needs all budget requests as soon as possible. We raised around \$1500 from our chicken and biscuit dinner. We also raised a little over \$600 from our Fall Festival food booth. Chad motioned to approve the treasurer's report, Charlotte seconded. Treasure's report was approved.

#### I AREAS OF ACCOMPLISHMENT

Now that the Fall program has settled in to its new rhythm these are the classes that I'm either teaching or am involved in: a) Men's Tuesday Bible Study; b) Women's Tues Bible Study; c) Wed. Money Management Make up session; d) Thurs. Money Management Class; e) Sunday Confirmation Classes. This is quite the load, which is challenging, but at the same time very rewarding.

The Mission Team 2020 (our 21st Year) convened on the second Sunday of October, (10/13/19). This year's destination was announced, and it is LaCrosse WI. The dates for the MT20 are June 14 (Send Off Sunday) and June 21 (Return Sunday service) The MT20 members will be back home on Saturday June 20, but the "trip is not over" until the Come Back Service is complete. We've been to LaCrosse before and have had a great experience with this Habitat Affiliate.

October 12<sup>th</sup>. Was Ruby's Pantry. We had a complete "sell-out" of all shares. This was at one level good, but at another level it is hard to say "sorry we're all out" to those 6 or so families who came for food. Earlier in the month (10/5//19) at North Heights Church, I attended the Ruby's Pantry Annual Conference. The chief announcement is that RP is coming out with new, Web-based registration materials. They hope to begin "rolling it out" in January 2020. We'll see about that

### **Budget and Election Meeting-2019**

The Budget and Election meeting was held on November 17, 2019. Copies of the budget and the ballot for election of the officers was distributed to persons attending. Sheldon Betzold, Moderator, opened the meeting with prayer at 10:55 am.


Sheldon read the minutes from the 2018 Congregational Budget meeting. The floor was open for questions or discussion. Thelma Betzold moved to accept the minutes; Jeff Bylander seconded the motion. It was voted on and approved.

Chad Leonard discussed the current budget. He said if weekly giving maintains, then we will be able to make our budget for 2019. Some unexpected expenditures came up this year, but we were able to move and transfer funds to accommodate the expenses that arose.

Virginia Ormsby presented the 2020 budget. She discussed some of the expenses that will be

challenging for 2020, including a \$12,000 expenditure for a new air conditioning unit. The concept of e-giving was discussed and expenditures involved with that. Even though there are minimal processing fees, it still is beneficial to streamline the giving process. Tom Bowen moved to accept the 2020 Budget, Jeff Bylander seconded. The motion was voted on and approved.

Chad Leonard discussed the importance of upgrading our security system for the church building. Scott Smith asked for examples and discussion as to why we need to improve our security and surveillance of the building. Chad gave several examples of ways in which the building is used including: Boy Scouts, Ruby's Pantry and our Youth group. With so many various ways in which our building is used, we want the people here to be safe. Tom Bowen confirmed that it is a good idea to make the building more secure, it helps with our outreach to the community; people using the building will feel




more secure. When you have many outreach programs to the community, you have more and more people coming in and out of our doors...which is a good thing. However, with more people also comes more opportunities for "issues". After a short discussion on this topic, Tom Bowen made a motion to provide funds, not to exceed \$5,000, to proceed with upgrades to our building's security and a surveillance system. Rick Maukstad seconded the motion. It was voted on and approved.

The current ballot of officers was presented. The need to fill the position of Financial Secretary was brought forth. Abby Betzold made a Motion to accept the Ballot as printed, Chad seconded. The Ballot was voted on and approved.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:20 am.
