

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This year's Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday, February 17 and ends on Easter, April 4. Our Lenten study is being planned as of this writing and more information will be in your future email and Sunday announcements.

Meanwhile, included in this article are a few thoughts to consider moving toward Lent... How are we, rational, early 21st Century, intelligent, scientifically inclined folks supposed to understand the resurrection of Christ? How do we, as Christians, live into the "greatest story ever told?" I'm sure many of you have asked yourself, or been asked by your kids or friends how you do it.

One way to think about our faith stories is by understanding that our modern world relies on logos rather than mythos. ¹Logos language includes facts, data, evidence, and precise descriptions. Rob Bell describes how "logos language and thinking got us medicine, got us airplanes. . . For the past three hundred years we have had an explosion of logos language. . . But the problem is, there are whole dimensions of our existence that require a different way of thinking."

Bell rightly says, "The Bible is mostly written in mythos language.
.. Good religion traffics in mythos.

... Mythos language is "more than

literally true". . . Evolutionary science does an excellent job of explaining why I don't have a tail. It just doesn't do so well explaining why I find that interesting!" We need mythos language to express the more-than-factual meaning of experiences like falling in love, grief, and death.

Good religion, art, poetry, and myth point us to the deeper levels of truth that logos can't fully explain. This is why most (not all) of my sermons rely on both poetic mythos language and logos logic... My experience tells me that our modern/post-modern minds need (scientific/didactic) logos to feel comfortable in our contemporary world combined with (spiritual/poetic) mythos to go beyond the "truth."

So, to put our mythos hats on for a moment...²For The Franciscan philosopher and Doctor of the Church, St. Bonaventure of Bagnoregio (1217-1274), the perfection of God and God's creation is quite simply a full circle. and to be perfect the circle must and will complete itself. The beginning and the ending of a circle is the same... Alpha and Omega are the same. The lynchpin holding it all in unity is the "Christ Mystery," or the essential unity of matter and spirit, humanity and divinity. The Christ Mystery—the crucified and resurrected Christ—becomes the visible template for the pattern of all creation. Christ reveals the necessary cycle of loss and renewal that keeps all things

Will you be Mine? Love, Jesus


Breauna Pitchford:

Ava Schertler: Jesus is my valentine because He really made me see the little things in life.









NOTES OF GRATITUDE FOR OUR OWN SECRET SANTA



Council Meeting: January 12, 2021 (Zoom Meeting)

ATTENDANCE: Pastor Garth Schumacher, Sheldon Betzold: Moderator, Sandy Morris: Clerk, Richard Wooldridge: Financial Secretary, Charlotte Gillen: Youth Director, Barry Tulkki: Diaconate, Chad Leonard: Trustees, Abby Betzold: Congregational Giving, Shanon Hayes: Mission and Social Concerns, Rae Wooldridge: Congregational Giving, Julie Smith: Recording Secretary

Pastor Garth opened the meeting with prayer at 6:03 pm.

The Minutes from the previous Council Meeting were discussed and approved.

TREASURER: Virginia was not present, but Richard Wooldridge, Financial Secretary presented an overview of the financial report. He said that \$13,000 was moved from General Reserves to the operations budget. This allows us to start 2021 with a balanced budget. The budget was voted on and approved.

CLERK: Sandy presented the Clerk's report. She stated there were no changes in membership. The current membership role is at 168.

YOUTH: Char reported that the Wednesday Youth group continued to meet via Zoom during the month of December, averaging 3 to 5 kids participating. Now that the Youth group has returned to in-person meeting, the attendance is up to about 12. Our Youth group has been following the Amery Public Schools in terms of closures and reconvening.

TRUSTEES: Chad reported on the recent work of the Trustees. He said they have been receiving quotes for work on replacing the kitchen floor. Also, the Trustees hope to develop a sub-committee for purposes of financial planning. They hope to make better use of our sources to help the needs of the church.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Char stated that she no longer chairs the Christian Education program. Sheldon stated that hopefully a member on that board would be able to attend Council Meetings in the future. Char stated that the committee did help to coordinate a successful Children's Christmas program.

DIACONATE: Barry Tulkki stated that his committee did not meet this month.

CONGREGATIONAL GIVING: Abby said that the Congregational Giving Committee will be meeting again soon. She hopes to organize with the committee an additional fund raising campaign to "jump start" 2021.

MISSION AND SOCIAL CONCERNS: Shanon reported her committee had sent out "Veterans of the Cross" letters for the Christmas time fund drive. The fund is created for retired clergy or members in need. PASTOR REPORT: Pastor Garth said the installation service of new officers and committee members will take place January 17. He also stated that we need to continue discussions and form a committee if we are interested in having our church receive the designation "Open & Affirming". This is a designation given by the leadership of the UCC church. It is a program that provides ways of welcoming the LGBTQ community. NEW BUSINESS: Our traditional spring "Walleye Dinner" has been postponed in light of the current situation with COVID restrictions.

Discussions were held on how we can gradually proceed to return to in-person worship services. We realize that some people do not have access to internet service and are not able to watch the Facebook services. We would like to allow a few people at a time to come and watch the service on the TV in fellowship hall. Rae has volunteered to coordinate this effort, as she is in contact with many members who would benefit from this. Please reach out to Rae if you do not have internet access and would like to participate in this program. Audience members will not be in the main sanctuary; rather they will be social-distancing and watching on a TV in fellowship hall.

Another discussion about resuming in-person services was about **Outdoor Worship**. Ideas were brought forth about possibly creating a more permanent outdoor structure in the green space. This would help to make outdoor services more enjoyable and something we could do even beyond Covid restrictions time. It was speculated that we might be able to start Outdoor Worship in April or May.

Sheldon said the next Council Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 9 at 6:00pm Meeting was adjourned at 7:12 pm.
