WEDNESDAY NIGHT FOCUS GROUPS IN JANUARY

Beginning Wednesday, January 6, I'll be leading 4 focus groups to help us discern who we are as a church today and what our hopes and dreams are for our future church. This process will be crucial in helping us create a church profile that truly reflects the values, hopes, and dreams of our congregation. We're still working on setting precise time... but, it will be early evening and again, on Zoom.

PÁSTORAL SEARCH COMMITTEE IS ALREADY MEETING The Pulpit Committee has formed the core of our pastoral search and is beginning to plan the timetable for finding our next settled pastor. It is the hope of the committee that they'll be able to have our first draft of the church's profile in May 2021; Give the congregation time to offer suggestions; Create a finalized church profile by late Summer; and begin reading potential minister profiles by the Fall, 2021. So, your input in our church focus groups will be very important in helping us hit the ground running.

hat is the meaning of poinsettias? Also known as the Christmas Star and Christmas Flower, it's said that poinsettias' association with Christmas comes from a Mexican legend. The story goes that a child, with no means for a grander gift, gathered humble weeds from the side of the road to place at the church alter on Christmas Eve. As the congregation witnessed a Christmas miracle, the weeds turned into brilliant red and green flowers.

Named after Joel Roberts Poinsett, first United States ambassador to Mexico and the amateur botanist who introduced the plant to the U.S. in 1825, the poinsettia is also known as Mexican Flame Leaf, Winter Rose. Noche Buena and, in Turkey, Atakurk's Flower, because it was the favorite flower of Atakurk, the founder of modern Turkey.

While considered by the ancient Aztecs to be symbols of purity, in today's language of flowers, red, white or pink poinsettias, the December birth flower, symbolize good cheer and success and are said to bring wishes of mirth and celebration.

Council Meeting: November 10, 2020

ATTENDANCE: Pastor Garth Schumacher, Sheldon Betzold: Moderator, Virginia Ormsby: Treasurer, Sandy Morris: Clerk, Richard Wooldridge: Financial Secretary, Charlotte Gillen: Youth Director and Christian Education, Barry Tulkki: Diaconate, Chad Leonard: Trustees, Abby Betzold: Congregational Giving, Shanon Hayes: Mission and Social Concerns, Rae Wooldridge: Congregational Giving, Julie Smith: Recording Secretary Pastor Garth opened the meeting with prayer at 6:05 pm.

The Minutes from the previous Council Meeting were discussed and approved.

TREASURER: Virginia presented the Treasurer's report. She expressed a concern that October's income was \$4,600 less than expenses to date. Chad explained that some donations are made every 6 months and that may cause discrepancies. Sandy moved to hold the financial reports for further review until next month.

CLERK: Sandy presented the Clerk's report. She stated that two members transferred their membership to Baldwin. The current membership role is at 168.

YOUTH: Char reported that the Wednesday Youth group has been averaging anywhere from 8 to 18 kids. Generally, in terms of scheduling for the Youth, we follow the Amery Public Schools. Since the schools have seen a marked increase in the cases of COVID-19, the schools will be closing and reverting to distance learning as of Monday, Nov. 16. It was discussed and decided that this Wednesday the Youth group will meet and then will reconvene after the schools open up again.

TRUSTEES: Chad reported on recent work of the Trustees. He said that the plans for work on the kitchen (fixing the grease trap system) had previously been postponed, but they hope to start work on this Monday (Nov. 16th)

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: Char reported on the Christian Education program. A Christmas program has been selected and several families have agreed to participate.

DIACONATE: Barry Tulkki reported that the Diaconate had a Zoom meeting and his committee has organized some phone trees to make calls to church members. The calls to members hopefully will help to keep people informed and feel connected with each other.

Plans for the Annual Budget & Elections meeting were discussed. The date of December 6 was selected for such meeting. Several notifications of the meeting will be given to the congregation.

Chad made a motion for the purchase of a second camera to use with video sermons and similar needs. He also requested that the discussion of the October budget be included at the December 6 budget meeting. Abby seconded the motion and it passed.

CONGREGATIONAL GIVING: Abby said that the Congregational Giving Committee just sent out a letter to members today. It highlighted some of the things our church is doing and also includes Pledge cards and also encourages members to give of their time and talents.

MISSION AND SOCIAL CONCERNS: Shanon said that the committee had not met recently and she had no news to report. Several suggestions and ideas were discussed on how to make it easier for their committee members to get together and some ideas of projects for the committee.

PASTOR REPORT: Pastor Garth said that since he has started with us he has made several pastoral calls. He has also had some success with the Zoom classes for the Confirmation class, however he would like to revise the Confirmation schedule so the classes would be smaller. Working with a smaller group would make it more personal and hopefully more meaningful to the Confirmands.

(Pastor report...continued) He also suggested that he would like to add a Zoom coffee fellowship at 11:15 on Sunday mornings. This would help bring a sense of connection for our members.

Pastor Garth also said that he eventually would like to open the discussions about having our church receive the designation "Open & Affirming". This is a designation given by the leadership of the UCC church. It is a program that provides ways of welcoming the LGBTQ community.

NEW BUSINESS: An extensive discussion was held about how the pandemic is affecting our worship services and the church as a whole. Many opinions and ideas were discussed of whether or not we should continue with services at the church or go to virtual only. Chad made a motion that starting on November 22, the services will be on-line only. This was voted on and approved,

Sheldon said the next Council Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, December 8 at 6:00pm

Meeting was adjourned at 8:02 pm.


