#### As We Adventure Together By Reverend Garth Schumacher

THE TRANSFORMATIVE **POWER OF GREAT** QUESTIONS (HINT: We're in an adventure of "What do we want less of?" transformation)

Einstein said, "we cannot solve a problem from a mindset that created the problem."

Many church growth strategies fail to create transformational growth because the problem and the change process are in the same mindset. Transformation requires looking at things differently.

One way to change mindsets is to change the questions we are asking. When stuck, transformational leaders learn how to change the questions rather than simply try different solutions. David Cooperrider, the founder of Appreciative Inquiry found that organizations grow in the direction of the questions they ask. Because we want to grow into an abundant and transformational future, we'll be using Appreciative Inquiry to help us discern where we are and where we want to go as a church. From these questions, we'll have a better idea of the qualities we'll want in our next settled pastor.

For instance, we already know we are a "good" church. We know we have great qualities that might be attractive to future

ministers... so, we'll ask: "What do we want more of?" rather than asking:

Here is another possible change of questions:

If we are stuck trying to discern a way forward because "God" questions trip us up and are asking:

"What is God calling us to do?" What happens if instead you ask: "What is love calling us to do?" Is your answer to these questions the same?

If not, which do you need to change:

Your perspective of God or your perspective of Love?

Changing either perspective is likely to lead to transformation. Transformation was the primary movement of Jesus' ministry... it has been and will continue to be our adventure as well!! Go in the peace of love of God,



**Congregational Giving report from Rae**: Fall pledge drive is being planned.


**Old business**: Continue discussion on when, how and if church services will move inside. Singing will not be part of indoor service but ways to incorporate music will be planned.
